### **Word from the Minister**

#### **Dear Friends**

Luke 4 vv 14 – 21: Jesus at Nazareth

Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit and news about him spread through the whole countryside. He was teaching in their synagogues, and everyone praised him. He went to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, and on the Sabbath day he went into the synagogue, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was handed to him. Unrolling it, he found the place where it is written:

'The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour'.

Then he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant and sat down. The eyes of everyone in the synagogue were fastened on him. He began by saying to them, 'Today this scripture is fulfilled in your hearing.'

As I write this article various politicians once again are debating Europe and our relationship with the European Union. Some advocate closer ties, some a renegotiation and others that we should leave the union. In such matters politicians seek to set out their intentions and agenda. At the outset of his ministry Jesus returned to his home town of Nazareth and there in the synagogue he clearly set out his agenda.

He quoted the prophet Isaiah and in doing so was unreservedly saying that he was God's messenger empowered by the Spirit to announce the Good News of the Kingdom of God. And what was this Good News? It was to speak of a reordering of society and to work towards a society where all would be treated with dignity and worth, where the poor were given a new start and where principles of justice, mercy and peace would be paramount. The Kingdom of God would be one where people would be set free from their poverty and from their spiritual binds. Christ would open the eyes of both the blind and the spiritually blind. He would set free those who were oppressed either by unjust laws or by sin. As we reflect on Jesus manifesto

in the synagogue of Nazareth we are reminded that we are called to complete the work that He began as His body here on earth. We are challenged in these words of Jesus to consider how today we can feed the hungry, set free the oppressed and open the eyes of the blind. We might for example support a charity working to give sight to the blind in the third world through basic surgeries or become a member of Amnesty International. In our Church we should not forget that at Easter and Christmas a small group of our members visit Eastville Prison. Our task as God's People today is with Jesus to also open the eyes of the spiritually blind, in grace to help set people free from sin, and to help the oppressed of body, mind and soul.

As we approach the season of Lent perhaps this year we might use this season to reflect on how we must fulfill these words of the prophet Isaiah in the same way as Jesus. How can we as God's People fulfill our mission to speak good news, be good news and bring good news to the world and to people around us? May God ever place this calling before us and may we in fulfilling it truly follow in the footsteps of Christ, for in further words of Jesus as recorded in the Gospel of Luke (the set gospel for this year)

'Whoever wants to save His life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me will save it' (Luke 9 v 24)

Peace in Christ.





# The very first Valentine card - a legend

The Roman Emperor Claudius II needed soldiers. He suspected that marriage made men want to stay at home instead of fighting wars, so he outlawed marriage.

A kind-hearted young priest named Valentine felt sorry for all the couples who wanted to marry, but couldn't. So secretly he married as many couples as he could - until the Emperor found out and condemned him to death. While he was in prison waiting execution, Valentine showed love and compassion to everyone around him, including his jailer. The jailer had a young daughter who was blind, but through Valentine's prayers, she was healed. Just before his death in Rome on 14 February, he wrote her a farewell message signed 'From your Valentine.'

So the very first Valentine card was not between lovers, but between a priest about to die, and a little girl, healed through his prayers.

And all things cry 'Glory!' to God all in all.




