Dear Friends...

The Need for Self-Discipline – 1 Corinthians 9 vv 24 - 27

Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last, but we do it to get a crown that will last forever. Therefore I do not run like someone running aimlessly; I do not fight like a boxer beating the air. No, I strike a blow to my body and make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize.

Well the Olympics are moving to a close with the Paralympics taking place between 29th August and 9th September. There has been much to remember – Jessica Ennis and Mo Farah winning gold, Team GBs record medal haul and an opening ceremony with the Queen escorted to the stadium by James Bond! What's in your hand?

September is the time when we get back to our normal routines after the summer break. It's a good opportunity to think how God could use us to make a real difference in our workplace, school, family, friends and community.

God equips us with everything we need to complete this work of showing love and establishing justice. In the film Chariots of Fire Eric Liddell, says, 'I believe God made me for a purpose, but he also made me fast. And when I run I feel His pleasure'. If we are doing what God wants us to do, we can really feel the joy and power of the Holy Spirit.

When God gave Moses the job of bringing the Israelites out of Egypt, he asked the question, 'What is in your hand?' (Exodus 4:2). Moses was holding his staff, which represented his livelihood (what he was good at); his resources (his flock represented his wealth) and his security (which God was asking him to lay down). God asks the same question of us: What has God given you? Our gifts, temperament, experience, relationships, mind, education can be used in the work he has given us to do. Are we willing to offer them to him to make a real difference in the places where he calls us to serve him?

John Ortberg in his book 'It All Goes Back In The Box' tells the story of Johnny the bagger. Johnny, 19 years old with Downs syndrome, worked at a supermarket checkout, putting people's items into bags. After a training event on how to make a difference, he decided that he wanted to do something special for his customers. His idea was to put a thought for the day into every bag; something positive about how good it is to be alive or how much people matter!

Every night his dad would help him carefully prepare the slips of paper and sign every one. Each time he bagged someone's groceries, he would put his saying on top of the last bag. Then he would look the person in the eye and say, 'I've put a great saying in your bag. I hope it helps you have a good day. Thanks for coming here.' A month later, the store manager noticed that the line at Johnny's checkout was three times longer than anyone else's! People wanted to get hold of Johnny's thought for the day. He was doing more than filling bags with groceries; he was filling lives with hope!

Opportunities for Spiritual Nurture

With reference to my encouragement to engage in spiritual disciplines in my minister's letter this month in addition to our regular Sunday Worship and monthly Messy Church the following opportunities are available to all:

Bible Study

The Monthly Bible Study will recommence on the evening of Tuesday 18 September and after exploring the Gospel of Mark earlier this year it is my intention through September to November for us to look at the first eleven chapters of Genesis. The Bible Study Group is both for those who know the Bible well and for those who want to get to know it more. It is so important we come together to do this and I give you every encouragement to come along, to share in the fellowship, and to hear what God may be saying to us through His gift of the Holy Scriptures.

What is prayer like?

Effective prayer seems to require a heart that desires to please God, even when there's no commandment involved. A child who loves a parent or grandparent will occasionally do something totally un-required, just in order to please them. Any parent or grandparent is delighted when a small child gives them something – be it only a crayon drawing, and totally undecipherable. What matters to parents is that the young child gave it spontaneously, from their heart, without any prompting.

Perhaps this is the kind of communication with us that pleases God—when we simply learn to enjoy his presence, and find our rest in him, and not ask him for anything. Our love and delight in him allows him to bless us fully.

How often do you pray with your children?

A recent study of 800 Christians in churches across England has found that nearly 62% of Christian couples pray together on some basis, and 63% pray with their children. As for a parent praying FOR their children, the study found that 42% of parents pray frequently for their children, and 40% of parents just sometimes. The Bible promises us that prayer is well worthwhile: "The Lord is near to all those who call upon him, to all that call upon him in truth.... he will hear their cry." Psalm 145:18,19





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For the Children – Mouse Makes



Ystrad Mynach

We enjoyed a splendid visit to our friends at Ystrad Mynach in South Wales on Sunday 12 August and we thank Tim Lansdown for organizing this very successful day which included tea and a service in which we heard about the life of Howell Harris who was a key figure in the Methodist Revival in the 18th Century, acquaintance of John and Charles Wesley and under whose ministry a certain William Williams was converted who wrote 'Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah' and many other hymns.

Among the other highlights of the day we were led on a brief excursion to the now closed mine in Ystrad Mynach which played a key part in the town's history and development. Here is the story of the mine as relayed on the day by one of the Church's members lvor:

'The South Wales Coalfield is like an upside down basin with coal outcropping at the north and the south of the coalfield. About 314-308 million years ago there was a luxurious cover of vegetation dominated by primitive plants notably giant ferns. Coal seams formed from buried trees during a period of forest growth over about several thousand years and sandstone laid down when the sea invaded the forest areas covering them with sand and silt. After a period of time renewed tectonic activity would lift up the area and another sequence begin. I once happened to be in an underground roadway and in front of me stood a column of stone that was actually a fossilized tree – to think I was looking at something that was millions of years old.

Penallta Colliery was sunk from 1905-1908 and 291 men were employed with the first coal being raised in 1909. The shafts were sunk by the Powell Duffryn Coal Company the largest coal company in South Wales and Britain in the early 20th Century and in many ways Penallta was their showcase. There were two shafts – air was drawn up the one shaft by means of an electric fan (this shaft was completely enclosed and was known as the upcast and the other was obviously called the downcast). The downcast shaft was 783 yards deep and the upcast shaft was 750 yards, at the time the deepest shaft in South Wales.

Penallta Colliery plays an important part in the history of mining in Wales. It was one of the largest collieries and the most important in the coalfield. In 1930 975,603 tons of saleable coal was raised and in 1931 the colliery

employed 3200 men. At one time nearly 20% of coal mined was exported making Cardiff and Barry two of the biggest exporting ports in the world.

Penallta was consistently one of Powell Duffryn most profitable pits during the inter war years along with Bargoed and Britannia Collieries. Its status as a star performer did not necessarily confer any favours on the miners who worked there. Powell Duffryn had a reputation in South Wales as a particularly poor employer in terms of pay, condition and safety in the workplace – in fact the letter P.D. on the side of their wagons for them did not stand for Powell Duffryn but 'Poverty and Dole'! A feature of the South Wales Coalfield was the high incidence of accidents and disasters and there were more accidents in Penallta Colliery than in any other.

Nationalisation in 1947 made the world of difference to the pay and working conditions of miners. The N.C.B. made new departments in the running of the colliery - safety, air quality control and new machinery for extracting coal and transporting it up to the pithead. Speaking as a surveyor we were able to obtain new surveying instruments (the one I was using at the time was over 50 years old!). Pit baths were built and many of the collieries had state registered nurses on site. The winding engines which had been driven by compression were now driven by electricity. However production eventually fell and the reserves of coal became too expensive to mine and Penallta closed in 1991. It was one of the few collieries to operate continually from the days of South Wales prominence as a superpower in global coal production to the virtual extinction of the Welsh Coal Industry in the 1990s and is one of the few collieries that has not been demolished'.

Friendly Table

We are now starting on our thirteenth year of serving lunches on a Monday. On average we serve around 60 meals each week. As the labour is voluntary we are able, each year, to make a profit which we usually share between the church and Kingswood Community Transport, who bring a good number of our customers along to the dinner.

We have about 20 willing volunteers who work in the kitchen and restaurant, some on a rota basis and others every week. However because of holidays, illness and family commitments we sometimes find ourselves short of numbers. If anyone feels they can assist in this very rewarding work, either on a rota basis or as a stand-by in case of need please have a word with Mary Golding.

<u>Signposts</u>

Time has been so important these last weeks as the Olympics have taken place, to go faster – record after record broken – success for many. For others though they did their best the ultimate prize eluded them. Also at this time many young people wait on examination results, will the right grades manage them to go on to the next step.

Surprisingly when Jesus chose the disciples and called them to follow Him they weren't all champions by any means but they were filled with enthusiasm to go where Jesus went and to learn from Him.

How to be able to share together in our aspirations, to join and celebrate in our joys and to console in times of disappointment.

As people who are precious to God, to follow His way and obeying His word we all are able to succeed.

The Psalmist wrote :

PS 119:127 Because I love your commands more than gold, more than pure gold, and because I consider all your precepts right, I hate every wrong path. Your statutes are wonderful; therefore I obey them. The unfolding of your words gives light; it gives understanding to the simple.

Jesus didn't give a lot of commands but He did say :

"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind". This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: "Love your neighbour as yourself."

If we can follow Jesus in this way then whatever comes our way we achieve gold.
