

# **Word from the Minister**

#### **Dear Friends**

When the Sabbath was over, Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought spices so that they might go to anoint Jesus' body. Very early on the first day of the week, just after sunrise, they were on their way to the tomb and they asked each other, "Who will roll the stone away from the entrance of the tomb?" But when they looked up, they saw that the stone, which was very large, had been rolled away. As they entered the tomb, they saw a young man dressed in a white robe sitting on the right side, and they were alarmed. 'Don't be alarmed', he said. "You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid him. But go tell his disciples and Peter, 'He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him, just as he told you'. Trembling and bewildered, the women went out and fled from the tomb. They said nothing to anyone, because they were afraid.

(Mark 16 vv 1-8)

Through the season of Lent and recently in our Monthly Bible Study we have been following the Gospel of Mark. As we approach Easter it is interesting to note in most Bibles you will find a footnote after verse 8 of the sixteenth and final chapter of Mark's gospel indicating that the additional verses (9-20) are not found in the most early manuscripts discovered to date and were probably added by a later writer eager to give a more satisfying end to the Gospel.

Scholars put forward various and alternate suggestions for the Gospel of Mark finishing at the eighth verse. Some say this ending is intentional and Mark therefore leaves us to consider the fact, awe and wonder of the resurrection. Like the women we may struggle initially to take in the magnitude of this reality on which the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ the Son of God is founded and anticipated from the first words of the Gospel (Mark 1v 1). Others ponder if Mark never completed his Gospel through arrest, persecution or death, of if there was a more complete ending originally and at some point that part of the original manuscript from which others were copied was either damaged or lost. It is intriguing. None of this should of course alter our faith in the Gospel record. The other Gospels certainly complete the picture for us detailing Jesus resurrection

appearances and his ascension. Nonetheless I think the ending of Mark gives us something important to think about and it is this.

Recognizing that Mark leaves us with the fact of the resurrection of Jesus then might we say we are the next chapter in the story of Jesus. For with Jesus' work completed and His whole life offered to us from His birth in Bethlehem, to His Baptism in the Jordan, to His ministry in Galilee, to His entrance into Jerusalem, to His death on a cross, His resurrection and the testimony of a heavenly message and an empty tomb, is it not now our responsibility to continue the story of Jesus? Are we not reminded it is we who are now called to walk the way of the cross leading lives of humility and service, bearing witness to the teaching of our Lord and bringing others to faith by our worship, words and action. So at Easter rejoice in the resurrection Jesus and be astounded by what God has done in revealing the true extent of His love and in raising Jesus from the dead giving us victory even over death. But also be challenged for the manner by which the Gospel of Mark ends reminds us that we are the next chapter in the story of Jesus and we must write this chapter by dedicating our lives in His service. Peace to you at Eastertide.

#### **HMC Is Not Recession Proof**

In the last few months we have seen the income that the Church receives from Room lettings become greater than that coming from collections and donations. Our average weekly offerings are slightly down by £16 per week this year. We are faced with on going costs of running the Church and keeping it well maintained in the face of rising costs, notably in utility bills for gas and electricity, as well as our obligations and commitments to the Circuit with the assessment payment, now nearly £45,000 a year. To explain, this assessment, payment has to be made to support the workings of the Methodist Church with such items as our Minister's stipend and the costs of running the Church at local, regional and national levels. As an indication of our need this means that on average each member of our Church should contribute £1 per day just to meet that commitment. The income from lettings, church fairs, gift day and gift aid helps substantially towards the running costs of the Church.

I must therefore ask that members review their givings, please. As far as I am aware many standing orders remain unchanged and some have been so for many years. Of course we appreciate that times are hard, and that many members have been so generous in donations and loans to the boiler fund. But please do look to see if you are able to help in some way. Be aware too that there are advantages to 'Gift Aid' your offerings by means of a straightforward declaration to the Inland Revenue (HMRC) for those that pay at least the standard Income Tax. Through this scheme your offerings can be enhanced by HMRC by a further 25%, and at no cost to you. I am the Gift Aid Secretary and will glad to give you details of this.

To appeal for money is an uncomfortable process, so I hope and pray that you will give some thought to your giving and take what action you can to help us to keep the standards you enjoy and we wish to continue in the essential work of maintenance and development of the Church.

#### **Easter Eggs**



#### FASTER FGGS

Easter eggs have been in the shops since just after Christmas but they are not a new idea. The egg has been used as a symbol of rebirth and new life since before Christian times.

The English name for Easter is said to come from Eostre, a northern goddess of spring. The rebirth of growing things in the spring, after the long dark days of winter, was a time of rejoicing in the pagan world and many of their rites and symbols have been carried over into our Christian festival of Easter.

In pagan times they celebrated the return of light and warmth to the world but our Easter celebrates so much more. We celebrate the fact that Jesus died for us and yet is not dead. We celebrate because Jesus overcame death.

And if all those brightly wrapped chocolate eggs in the shops help us to remember that Easter means new life, new life in Jesus, then good — I'll have lots!

#### BEAUTIFUL FGGS

Chocolate eggs are a new idea; the traditional Easter egg is a decorated hen's egg. Why not make some as special gifts to share the good news of Easter?



You can decorate them in the traditional method of wrapping eggs in onion skins and then boiling them. This gives a mottled, golden look to the egg (or try a couple of slices of beetroot for a different effect).

If you are not going to eat the egg afterwards you can decorate it with paint or felt tip pens. Painted eggs can look very special if, when the paint is dry, you stick on sequins and small beads. Rather than waste a perfectly good egg find out how to 'blow' the egg out of the shell – then you can eat the egg as well as having a perfect empty shell to decorate.

# **Caribbean Tales from Methodist International House**

The Caribbean Sea is part of the West Atlantic Ocean but separated from it by a series of islands known as the West Indies. This tropical sea has an area of 1,000,000 square miles, and is an important shipping route, mainly because of the Panama Canal. The West Indian islands here include the Windward Islands and the Leeward Islands, the Windward ones being southerly and nearer to South America and Guyana. The community at M.I.H. became Home from Home to a large number of students from this region, and from a variety of islands. Many were studying for further degrees in Education (M.Ed.) or (Ph.D.), others in engineering, art, medicine etc.

Whilst I was warden / manager I often visited churches in the District to explain the work of the Methodist church carried out, on their behalf, by the staff at M.I.H. On these visits, I regularly invited a student to accompany me. (We often attended weekend conferences too). It gave the residents an opportunity to give information from their islands about the situations they had to cope with (government restrictions, weather problems, agricultural difficulties, health, family structures, etc.) and give us an insight into their way of life. Obviously a visit to the area would have been better, but this was probably second best. Sometimes we were able to give them some type of gift on their return home.

Potluck supper Sunday at 5.00pm – prayer and medication to follow.

A headmaster from Anguilla was quite impressed when he heard Dorry and Jonathan playing their recorders (we didn't realise they were that good!), and made enquiries about costs. He thought the young pupils at his school could enjoy performing as an orchestra as it seemed an easy instrument to play. We had a few fund raising events, and presented him with 15 recorders and these eventually produced beautiful music in Anguilla.

Several teachers came from St.Lucia. One who lived in sight of the airport, taught Jonathan to play the piano. Another, a lady teacher from a poor area of the capital, Castries, told us of the difficulties in providing meals at school for some of the undernourished (and so under achieving) young pupils. Again, after fund raising, a cooking stove of a suitable type was purchased,

and money, for shipping it, provided. A very valuable addition to the welfare of those children given by the school.

A very different type of help was needed and given to a man from another island. I had received a call from the British Council, to the effect that a tragedy on an island in the Caribbean affected our resident. They failed to locate him and asked that we should break the news, as it was a weekend. Evidently a neighbour in his home cul-de-sac had run amok, shooting and killing several people including one of his family. Obviously care and counseling as well as physical help regarding travel arrangements were a priority. This we were able to provide. We realised how valuable a place like M.I.H. was in circumstances like this. How would he have coped if he had been in a bed-sit on his own?

A bean supper will be held on Tuesday evening in the church hall. Music will follow.

This prayer comes from the Methodist Prayer Manual for the Methodists in the Caribbean "Gracious God, your Son, Jesus Christ, endeavoured in all aspects of His earthly life to be about Your business and has given us an example of commitment and wholesome living. We pray that this same spirit may permeate the lives of Methodists in the Caribbean area. We pray especially for young people who live with the growing culture of drugs, human trafficking, gang warfare and sexual abuse. We thank you for those who committed their lives to Christ at a conference in 2010 and pray that they may be positive role models for their peers. Amen." This is a shortened version of a prayer by Franklyn Manners, President of the Leeward Islands.

As a family we still have contact with several past residents living in Barbados, Anguilla, Monserat, St.Kitts and Nevis, Antigua, Jamaica, and Turks and Caicos. I sometimes feel it would be a pleasure to make the journey to link up and reminisce (even in our retirement!). At the beginning of the academic year, British students usually had parental help in relocating to halls of residence; coming with all manner of packages computers and bikes. This assistance is not available if you have flown in from abroad. A plan was organised, arranging 'meet and greet' students at the airports or in Bristol at rail or bus stations. This was a very useful venture, as it included (after the new arrival had been given refreshment) an introduction to the local shops and area. It also introduced people to one another; so at least one friendly face was around to greet you! Sometimes

these friendships became deep and long lasting. A young engineer from Guyana ('from Demerara where the sugar comes from') welcomed an English girl student who had experienced the 'Hills of Bristol' as she had cycled from Temple Meads and was almost exhausted. He gave her soup and new bread and took her to the shops of Clifton. Eventually they became engaged and married and with their family, still live in Bristol.

If you shop at Sainsbury's you are probably aware that their bananas are Fairly Traded and that they come in from the Windward Islands. Evidently Sainsbury's purchase almost all of the bananas grown in those islands. A few years ago I spoke at our Bright Hour meeting, bringing with me a resident who was from St.Lucia. She told us of the difficulties experienced by the farmers on St. Lucia as new regulations regarding crops and marketing were affecting them. Evidently, America had decreed that the Windward Island crops were no longer needed in America. This also coincided with the time that Britain decided that we needed our imported bananas to measure more than 5" and that they had to be straight! This of course meant that the small Windward bananas were no longer suitable for our markets. After protesting, the farmers were told 'You must diversify'. As our St. Lucian lady told us, 'How can you diversify when the soil is only suitable for banana growing, and the climate is as it is? The islands depend on this crop and on holiday makers.' After our visits to various churches where she made her plea to us to support the farmers of the Windward Isles we christened' her 'Our Banana Queen'. The fact that the fairly traded fruits system of farming and marketing has developed has saved the islanders of the Caribbean. These small bananas are ideal for lunch boxes, and for small appetites! I know that when our 'Banana Queen' returned home and became involved in the political aspects of St. Lucia she was very supportive of the farmers, and their concerns.

I feel honoured to know that one of the M.I.H. residents who completed her Ph.D. (Doctorate in Education); has attained the position of Governor General of her home island i.e. of St. Lucia; has since been awarded Doctor of Letters by the University of Bristol, and above all, has been made a Dame. When Jonathan visited the Caribbean with a Dutch sailing team (he went as the cook), he was able to visit the Governor at Government House. She made him very welcome, gave him a tour of the House and refreshment. During the time whilst Donald has been ill, she has spared time to visit us here and has recently sent word to our family as she recalls

Donald, and the pleasurable times we enjoyed during her student days, and her visits to our home here. She has signed 'Erstwhile Banana Queen'. Coming from an ordinary family, educated at an ordinary school, and at university, she has empathy with the ordinary people of her beloved island. I am sure that, if she came again to visit Bright Hour (or wives, or Y's Men), her message would include 'Please buy Windward bananas!'

As we continue our journey through life our Christian calling is to care for people, as we would wish to be cared for. Jesus gave us the pattern. It sounds an easy one to follow. 'LOVE ONE ANOTHER'. We all know that it isn't as easy as it sounds! Perhaps the need is for us to try harder, and to trust in the promise of Jesus that he is with us and will guide and support us.

Let there be love shared among us, let there be love in our eyes. May now Your love sweep this nation, cause us O Lord to arise Give us a fresh understanding of brotherly love that is real, Let there be love shared among us; Let there be love.
