Dear Friends

You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven (Matthew 5 vv 14 – 16)

I begin this letter by acknowledging the passing of Don Blackmore who has been a loyal servant of the Church and whose life touched all who knew him. We very much continue to hold Don in our memory with thanksgiving and Dorothy and all the family in our thoughts and prayers at this time. It seems to me that one thing among so many one could say about Don is that he let the light of his faith shine forth in every sphere of his life and in so doing we have all been blessed and pointed towards the good things of the kingdom as spoken of in the above words of Jesus. We take comfort in knowing that Don is at peace and in that place where the light of God never dims and the joy and peace of God is ever known. Within this magazine you will also find words of thanks penned by Don and Dorothy shortly before Don made that journey by which he has inherited the good reward from the Master whom he ever served and for which we give thanks. In the words of St. Paul 'they who die in Christ will rise with Christ'.

We also think of the above words of Jesus in the context of this Olympic Year. However such a public living out of the Christian life will also come at great blessing to us, as among those who witness the love we find in God and the peace we find in Christ and of which we speak there will be those who as a result seek the same for themselves. And might I add — can there be any greater gift we can give another? One Christian writer has said sharing the Christian Faith is akin to one person

who has been hungry telling another where he can find bread. Jesus also spoke of the kingdom of God as akin to the finest treasure any man or women could possess, a treasure which by grace is in our possession to share. So let us embrace and live out the Christian life publicly and openly in this New and Olympic Year. Let us tell others of the faith and the Saviour we have found and let us with Don and all who have gone before us so let our light shine forth that others may see our good deeds and with us come to glorify God in Heaven. And let consider that Jesus is depending upon us! He says to us 'You are the light of the world'. What a responsibility but oh what a privilege!

It Is That Time Of Year To Say Thank You

We are well into the new year of 2012, so one could expect that those letters have been composed, written, addressed, posted and received. Do I hear a question? I am sure you realise I am referring to those letters saying 'thank you' for gifts sent to you when you were unable to thank the giver. I know that the beginning of January saw the postman delivering words of gratitude from most readers of this magazine!!!

At the Methodist International House of Bristol [M.I.H. now closed] we had several examples of thanks from different cultures, some causing amusement. The first I relate happened to my deputy, Barbara Asprey.

One morning, a student from Saudi Arabia, who was learning English, came to the Deputy Warden in the office and asked her to make a phone

call for him as he didn't think his command of English was good enough. The simple call was made and a note left on the hall table to say all was well and there were no problems.

During the afternoon, when the Deputy Warden left the office and went into the hallway, the student came out of the T.V. room and said to her "You are my sun and my moon - if you were mine, I would carry you from room to room - your feet would never touch the ground etc, etc." From the sitting room came a young man from Algeria who had heard what was going on and said, "For goodness sake - what are you saying to this poor woman - why can't you just say thank you!" (His command of English was very good!)

My second is an event most would not wish to imitate as it was very long-winded. An extremely articulate gentleman student from Nigeria came to the lounge of our flat on the first floor of M.I.H. to speak on behalf of a Nigerian lady who had experienced a very difficult situation. As part of our caring, much time was spent with her to extricate her from her dilemma and she was very grateful. However, Mr A decided to come to show his appreciation on behalf of all Nigerian students at Bristol University! She came with Mr A bringing gifts of Nigerian sweetmeats and fruit juices. Dressed in full national costume, looking really very elegant, they came in and offered the refreshments. Mr A then stood. He commenced his speech of gratitude, being "aware of and thankful for such kindness shown to a fellow countryman in her distress" and so on and so forth for well over half an hour, with all the arm actions of an actor in full flow. A very memorable 'Thank you'

Written and spoken tokens of gratitude were received during our years at M.I.H. both from the residents themselves and from their families, for medical care, for creating a family atmosphere, for transporting them to airports or docks and other situations. Two much treasured 'thank you' items I mention were a signet type ring, from the oldest sister of two teenage refugee lads, for being their 'pseudo mother' and an ash tray made in the shape of a swan but made from two coco cola drink cans. The cans were cut with ordinary scissors, and plaited into shape by a Chinese lady as the events of Tianneman Square unfolded. With the other Chinese student residents she was very appreciative of a Safe House.

I now take this opportunity of offering a thank you to the whole host of people in our church family. Donald and I have been enveloped in love and care from you. So many phone calls, letters, flowers, cakes, visits,

offers of help, shopping etc have helped us through the last difficult months when we have not had the physical presence of your caring Christian love. Above all, we would like to say thank you for your prayers. We really have felt the encompassing circle of intense prayer being offered by so many people enabling us to experience the Peace that comes from those prayers being answered. We have never felt abandoned or forgotten - you have not allowed us to be!

My final words come from a letter we received today. It caused a 'Praise the Lord' as the letter came by post from Japan. Yes it is from Yuko, our special Japanese resident, now a lawyer. She writes "Thank you very much for your prayers. We deeply feel warmth and sincerity from abroad. The earthquake and tsunami on 11 March 2011 was too much for us. We learned from the disaster that a monotonous daily life is precious. I WISH YOU MONOTONOUS HAPPY DAYS IN 2012."

Similar greetings to you from Donald and I. Now – have you got any more letters to write?





Charles Joseph Whittuck Trust Fund – the end of era

Edward Williams of Oldland Common William Stibbs of Oldland Common Henry Andrews Medway of Bristol James Chilcott of Bristol Daniel Whitchurch of Hanham Farmer Farmer Clothier Woollen Draper Wheelwright

These were the founder Trustees of the Whittuck Trust Fund set up on 27 October 1870 when Charles Joseph Whittuck purchased, on their behalf, 20 £20 guaranteed 4.5% preference shares in the Cornwall Railway Company.

The dividends received would be divided:

¼ of the dividends interest to the Primitive Methodist Church, Oldlands Common Independent Church called The Tabernacle at Oldlands Common, Baptist Chapel at Hanham, one eighth to Independent Church called the Tabernacle at Hanham and one eighth Methodist Free Church at Hanham.

These were to be distributed at the discretion of the Trustees between and amongst such poor persons, members of the respective Churches or Congregations considered most deserving in gifts of not less than five shillings and not more than ten shillings distributed during the week immediately preceding Christmas Day in every year.

As the fund was held in Railway shares the Government froze returns at the beginning of the Second World War locking them as war bonds for forty years. On the funds being released the Trustees at Hanham Baptist Church, who had the job to administer the fund, resumed what the war had

interrupted and each of the designated Churches were invited to a Trustees meeting.

It was in 1987 that Rev. Graham Thompson asked Sue and myself to be the representative Trustees for Hanham Methodist Church and it was decided to keep the essence of the original fund intention in that each year we would use some of the received funds to distribute gifts in the week preceding Christmas. A list of names was given to us by Graham and it was agreed that once we started to distribute to a person this would continue until no longer possible. From that original list the last remaining person received their gift in December. On my taking it to them I was greeted with "it must be December" and we then continued with a conversation about past events and times in Hanham and the Whittuck Trust Fund.

As the years passed and with no additions to the capital, the returns became less, therefore, in order to keep payments flowing and follow the intentions of the fund it was decided to slowly reduce the capital until the fund was exhausted. With the distribution of funds in December 2011 the fund was closed.

We thank God for the vision and generosity of Charles Joseph Whittuck who has, over the last 141 years, helped and supported many people in the Hanham and Oldland Area.
