
⁵ Keep your life free from love of money, and be content with what you have, for he has said, "I will never leave you nor forsake you." ⁶ So we can confidently say,

We are in many ways very fortunate at Hanham we still have a good size congregation at worship on a Sunday and at activities during the week. We are however an ageing congregation (no offence), over the years we haven't found the key that has encouraged younger people to stay and take on roles with in the church. In this we are not unique it is a problem facing a lot of churches.

What about the present? There are things we can do right now to start us on the road to that brighter future. A consultation group is being formed to look at the future for our buildings. We also need people to come forward now to take on jobs that need to be done. We need people to help with Youth Church. Natalie has taken on the role of leader and she has ideas that she would like to discuss with the young people about how they see the future of youth church. However without help to run it now in its traditional form we cannot take it forward, with the hope of encouraging the young

people to stay involved or to want to come back to us after they have been away to university.

Messy Church is also in need of help. Over the years Messy Church has been a fantastic resource for outreach and mission. Many families have learnt about the stories in the Bible and the love of Jesus. Ok so I know there is a train of thought that it hasn't brought people into our traditional worship on a Sunday but maybe the traditional service is not for everyone, maybe we need to look at a midweek non-traditional form of worship (just an idea) to run alongside our normal Sunday services, but without people to help on a Sunday once a month we may lose Messy Church and the connection with these families.

Then we also need people to be church stewards to help run the church, to help with the smooth running of the services on a Sunday and make sure ideas are discussed and moved forward.

In short it comes back to the power of prayer. We need to pray about this as individuals and as a church for people to come forward and fill these roles. We have all taken on various jobs over the years but we still need to keep doing them. We don't have the young people (at the moment) to hand the baton on to so to speak. Without us fulfilling these roles there will be no future. So please use the power of prayer and listen carefully for the answer, is God telling you that this is something you can do. I do hope so because Hanham Methodist Church needs you and future generations will thank you for it.

WESLEY'S WISDOM

4. Hymn singing

'Methodism was born in song' are the opening words of the preface to the 1933 'Methodist Hymn Book'. And Brian Hoare, no doubt, had this in mind when he wrote and composed the hymn 'Born in Song'. People of other denominations will freely admit that no-one sings like the Methodist do. To be in a full church with a good organist and a well-known hymn can indeed be a truly uplifting experience.

John Wesley was a great advocate of hymn singing, though he only suggested about two hymns in a service, as he wanted the service to last only the hour, therefore leaving plenty of time for a full blown sermon. The accompaniment would also have been different as there would have been no organ to be played. In fact he preferred that hymns be sung unaccompanied. Although he does write 'I have no objection to instruments of music in our worship, provided they are neither seen nor heard'. I am not sure what he meant by the last phrase of that sentence for there seems little point in having musicians if they cannot be heard.

For Wesley the words were more important than the tune and he believed that through hymn singing the people may express there worship of God and learn what they should believe. He didn't like what he called 'simplistic songs' and would ensure that hymns only contained 'appropriate' theology. I'm sure that Charles' hymns would have stood the test although it is claimed that John would vet them and alter them if necessary before publication.

He, typically, gave rules about hymn singing.

- 1) hymns should not be altered or amended (compliers if Singing the Faith please note)
- 2) Sing them even if you have not a good voice (amen to that!)
- 3) Sing lustily at a good speed but do not bawl
- 4) Sing them at a reasonable speed (thank you Richard and Philip)
- 5) Most important of all sing them spiritually.

The more I read through 'Singing the Faith' the more I realise what a wonderful collection of hymns both modern and traditional we have. There are hymns to fit every occasion, every mood and ever element of worship. Let us use them and learn from them and thank God for all who have written the words and the music.





Every month on a Sunday afternoon something strange happens in our church. The hall gets taken over by paint, glue and scissors. The kitchen is bursting with tiny sandwiches fit for a party feast. The church is filled with small children running around unrestrained by onlooking parents. "But Sunday is a day for church", you may think. Well we think so too, and that's why every month the Messy Church team run something different, because church is for everyone.

Messy Church has been running in Hanham Methodist for 9 years, inviting families with young children through our church doors to learn about God. Each month we take a different bible story and get stuck in, to bring the bible to life. We start with crafts and games that explore the story. From making lion masks when learning about Daniel, to building the walls of Jericho from cereal boxes, we love to get messy!

Once the crafts have been made and the games have been played, the service begins. Worship songs, creative prayer, the telling of the bible story and even a puppet performance are squeezed into a 20-minute service. After the service we enjoy a buffet tea and a chat.

Messy Church is real church. We learn about the bible together, worship together, pray together and eat together. Messy Church may be less polished, a little bit stickier, and a lot louder, but that's why we love it. Church is a place to be excited about a living God, and excitement is something the kids at Messy Church have by the bucket load.

Friendly Table

Toward the end of 1999 a group of ladies and one gentleman from the church got together to plan a weekly lunch club. It was to be for anyone, but primarily for elderly and lonely people, offering a time of companionship as well as a two course



meal. It was decided to open on a Monday as that was the day that the Ladies Bright Hour met and it was felt that there would be a nucleus from the Bright Hour to support it. A competition was set up amongst Church members for an appropriate name and the winner was 'Friendly Table'.

So the Friendly Table opened in January 2000, the first meeting attracting about 25 members on a very rainy day. Since then only one of the original staff are still working with us and only one of the original customers is still attending. At the peak about two years ago we were serving around 50 lunches together with about 15 staff lunches, but we now average between 25 and 30 customers per week. We are indebted to Kingswood Community Transport who bring about a dozen of our clientele each week.

We offer a main course each week, but rotate it on a two monthly cycle. Soups or jacket potatoes are offered as an alternative. After the desert tea or coffee are served in the lounge.

We open every Monday apart from bank holidays except for a short break over Christmas and New Year and a longer break during the end of July and August when the Y's Men take over with their soups and deserts. In December we put on a full blown Christmas dinner for which we don't charge. Friendly Table is open to anyone who is looking for some company on Monday lunchtime. If you know of anyone who would find what we offer would suit them please tell them about us. The cost will remain at £4 for the forthcoming year.

We would also welcome some extra help with staff as we sometimes struggle to get enough cover. As the years go by we find the average age of the helpers is now approaching the average age of the customers! If anyone feels they can help out if only on a part –time basis we would welcome your help. We are a friendly bunch and have plenty of laughs along the way.

ARE YOU HERE GOD?: STRESS & HEALING

If you are that well-balanced, cheerful and optimistic person that I should like to be, then you need read no further! But if you feel almost too stressed to read this; were stressed yesterday and expect to be stressed tomorrow, then you will periodically continue to ask two questions: why is this so, and what can I do about it?

Among the more common causes of stress are the following:-

- + you are too conscientious and self-effacing, or feel guilty about not achieving more; maybe you let others down through selfish ambition. Perhaps you feel guilty for not doing more for others even when you should be relaxing and enjoying yourself.
- + you feel you are failing to cope with life because circumstances seem to conspire against you, for example most days you seem to possess too little time, finance or ability for what needs to be done!
- + you are sleeping badly, no longer experiencing that "feel good factor"
- + you are unavoidably unwell, or maybe you are grieving for someone.

Counselling and advice, intended to treat the causes of stress, may unfortunately be of limited value and depend for their success on a willingness to believe in and to adopt such advice.

It is often stated that "Time is a Healer" but Time usually takes a considerable amount of itself to do so, and it is important to fill the days with "meaningful activities" and to largely avoid those empty personal moments in which it is so easy to brood, feel guilty and descend into depression. Time does of course heal and has largely achieved its objective when those personal moments begin to feel more comfortable and panic-free as you come to terms with the situation and your involvement in it.

In our everyday life we learn to devise personal tricks for best dealing with the daily build-up of our stress – imagine the following scenario: You are a person inclined to be late for the start of almost everything in your daily life and arrive rather breathless still thinking about the last event in your day. What can you do? The usual advice for this condition includes learning to effectively manage personal time – *prepare a*

"Programme of Tasks to be done" complete with realistic time allocations and allow a contingency period to cover those little things that always go wrong when you are in a hurry. But can you afford the time to prepare such a programme?

"The Little Book of Calm", by Paul Wilson includes the following:

- 1. Most worries are future based they revolve around things that in most cases may never happen. Concentrate on the present and the future will take care of itself.
 - The Bible says "Take no thought for tomorrow; sufficient unto the day are the troubles thereof."
- 2. The most important skill in staying calm is not to lose sleep. The second most important skill is to be able to view all issues as small issues!
 - The Bible says something about consciously placing our problems with the Lord. At the end of the day a conscious act of "responsibility-transfer" (to God) may well make it possible to enjoy a reasonable night's rest and to see the problems from a different perspective in the morning.
- 3. Take a lesson in calmness from children: watch how they live every moment for the pleasure of that moment. Pretend, and pretence may change into reality.
 - The Bible says something about the need for us to be, in some matters, like little children. The concept that "Pretence may change into reality" brings to mind Peter Boehler's advice to a doubting John Wesley: he said "...Preach faith till you have it; and then because you have it, you will preach faith".

The Christian Faith in action: the Christian Church advocates a different reality in which it is possible to experience a peaceful state of mind in the middle of life's turmoil. This reality resides in the spiritual condition of sensing the presence of God in our lives. So that like everyone else the Christian struggles in the midst of worry, illness and death but can call upon a Hope and Courage derived from knowing that God is with us, shares our burden and strengthens our human frailty.

This spiritual feeling is a kin to the child who cannot describe the love received from its parents. What the child does is to subconsciously absorb that love and then often respond to it in kind. If you were fortunate enough to have received such an upbringing then maybe you can recall the love you felt and its associated feelings of trust and assurance and well-being that remained when you were unwell.

A similar "Spiritual conviction" may result from a traumatic experience, for example, where someone has survived a life-terminating event or illness contrary to expert opinion. A person may also conclude that such deliverance was indeed an act of God! Whether such a belief is actually true or false may not be as important as the actions prompted and sustained by it, for example, John Wesley discovered "God's presence" during a non-conformist meeting where according to his journal **His heart was strangely warmed.** Now this "conversion experience" was clearly a reality for John, but even if he was mistaken, it would not diminish the positive achievements of John, Charles Wesley and Methodism which are traceable down through history.

There are occasions where God does not seem to wave his magic wand – we pray, but nothing seems to change and gradually the evil that is despair comes to engulf us. One explanation for this non-intervention may be a "faulty-expectancy" of God. This can be a problem where a person believes in God's ability and intention to **physically** intervene in our lives - a view claimed to be supported by Biblical interpretation. In order to maintain this belief and to justify God's apparent non-intervention, it can be argued that this must be God's will for reasons that will eventually be seen to have been for the best!

Obviously much more can be said about this difficult subject, but there remains one fundamental question to be addresses, namely, "Are You Here God?" and I leave the answer to you!

Prayer: Lord, bless us, strengthen our faith, grant us wisdom to act wisely and in the midst of our stress, suffering and doubt grant us Peace of Mind, Courage, Hope and finally Deliverance as we continue into our future.
